#### First Profile:

### **ADRIAN MORRIS – Chairman, Croquet Section**

I am chairman of the Croquet section of the club and represent the section on the General Committee of the main club. The main club is member owned and the GC runs the club on behalf of the members. The main club supports the Croquet section in many ways, not least, ensuring we comply with the vast range of legal requirements including Health & Safety, Welfare, and Diversity & Inclusion etc. etc. Thanks to this support, we can get on with running our section.

I joined Kenilworth Croquet in 2005 after taking early retirement from Land Rover. I had worked in Sales and Marketing for the same company from its British Leyland days.

In 2008, I took over the Chairman's role from Bill Sidebottom and have been Chairman since that date apart from a break for a couple of years while I was Club President.

I started playing Golf Croquet as I already had a little knowledge of that version but I was soon introduced to Association Croquet and I was hooked! The only GC I play now is the Kenilworth Cup each year, the Wells Cup for the Club Championship and the occasional appearance in the Federation League team. Most of my croquet is AC and played away from the club in tournaments all over the country and of course at the Inter-Counties tournament where I captain Warwickshire. I am a qualified referee for GC and AC. My handicap is 1 in GC and 1.5 in AC.

The role of chairman is primarily to chair the committee which manages all aspects of Croquet at the club to ensure we provide facilities and organisation to allow our members to enjoy their croquet whatever level they play. It is also our responsibility to ensure a positive financial contribution to the main cub.

As Chairman, I am the one who keeps an overall eye on all matters with in the section. The role may also include resolving the occasional dispute and very occasionally a possible disciplinary matter.

Some of the jobs that I currently handle include running the Croquet pages of the club website, keeping the calendar up to date, writing PR stories for the local press. Any volunteers to take on these roles would be welcome.

With my long membership and knowledge of both codes, I also tend to be the link with the national body for Croquet, the Croquet Association.

One matter which will need some of my time over the winter is to prepare for a significant change in the rules of Golf Croquet to be introduced next season. A small group will ensure we are familiar with these changes and then ensure all our members are aware before next season.

The other matter of import over the winter is planning our recruitment marketing for next spring. Our membership has declined over the last couple of years and we need to reverse this trend!

I am grateful for the support of the committee and others for their help to achieve our goals, but we are always keen to get more members involved. Please contact me if you feel you could volunteer, I'm sure we have a job which will fit you!

Round 1 gave a victory to Adrian over Alan by 26-7 just as time was called. The game between Cliff and Philip was an entertaining nail-biter! Philip was well ahead but a good break by Cliff who pegged out his ball gave him a two hoop advantage. Philip then managed to score one hoop and in his final turn drew level. The match then depended on the "Golden Hoop". Philip had left his two balls together and used this advantage to gain a victory 17-16.

The second round saw another victory by Adrian, beating Cliff 26-13. The game between Alan and Philip was another tight affair with Alan ahead but Philip narrowing the gap as the game reached time. At the end, Alan maintained his lead to win 16-12. With another victory for Adrian v Philip, 26-11, Adrian retained the trophy. Cliff's victory over Alan 13-7 gave Cliff the runner-up spot on nett hoops.
