

WE DID IT! CANOEING 715KM OF THE YUKON RIVER FOR MANX MENCAP Jon Hodge

There are moments in my life when I've been proud and honoured to have had the opportunity and gone on to achieve something. This is one of those moments. I'm delighted to say that I am proud of myself and so proud of our amazing Expedition Limitless 2024 team to have successfully paddled the 715km of the Yukon river from Whitehorse to Dawson City, where the Klondike River joins the Yukon River.





During the 12 days of paddling and wild camping - carrying all our food, equipment and clothing with us in our canoes - we had no break from the elements, with near freezing conditions, temperatures up to 28C, wind, rain, thunder and lightning and very cold water to contend with. It's hard to explain how vast the Yukon is. We saw many bald eagles, osprey, beavers, moose, but sadly no bear. We had some hairy moments crossing Lake Laberge, even with sitting it out for 3 or 4 hours until we could hit a break in the weather.

Even then we had to raft canoes, paddle whilst constantly bailing out for 75 minutes, and contend with head winds on the first day of the crossing and growing breaking waves on the second day, caused by tail winds. The weather also dictated our paddling days too. Our longest day started on the water at 4am (thanks to it not getting dark due to the high latitude) and ended that evening after paddling 89km (over 55 miles). We had highs and lows, but the team spirit remained high and we all helped each other - which is exactly what great teams do.

The cup changed hands for the next 3 years, going to **Peter Kristunas**, **Philip Mander** and **Cliff Daniel**. A 2-year break followed due to Covid, before **Pauline Harvey** returned to claim the cup in 2022 for a third time.

This GC cup was introduced in 2015, when it was won for the first two years by **Ray Clipson** and for the next two years by **Peter Kristunas**. After a break due to Covid, it somehow got overlooked until 2023, when Peter rediscovered it and handed it back to Lynne Breedon (Chair), who was entirely unaware of its existence.

And so the competition was reestablished in 2023, for higher handicapped players, and **Elizabeth Thomson** emerged as the unexpected winner of the revived trophy.

The Wells Cup is a fairly recent competition, introduced in the year 2017, to be the GC Club Championship trophy, for which the top GC players would participate annually.





The first and most frequent winner was Adrian Morris, with 3 wins during the first 4 years of the competition, eventually interrupted by Mervyn Harvey in 2019, who later won the cup a second time in 2023, defeating his old adversary, Adrian, in the final. Both of these men are talented players of both the croquet codes, AC and GC.

The only other winner of this cup so far is **Phil Blake**, in 2022, currently the lowest handicapped GC player in the club, a member of the successful 2023 GC Inter-Counties Midlands team, Second Division, and winner of several national tournaments.

Our "B" team in the WMF League played their second match on Friday 31st May, in somewhat dull, cool weather, with an unexpected shower or two. However, our enthusiasm wasn't dampened, and we made a good start, challenging our opponents from Eardisley in Herefordshire, not far from the Welsh border, to some close games. On paper, with handicaps totalling 14 to our 16, we were in for a close match, but with Eardisley the favourites to win.

The first round included two close losses, a convincing win, and a very pleasing win by our number 4 player (Pauline) over one of their 2-handicap players. He was in command on the Golden Hoop, with a ball about a yard away from the hoop, straight in front, when a lucky/skilful (?!) clear from almost 20 yards, made him nervous about his following shots, and eventually giving Kenilworth a successful shot at the hoop. This meant that we were 2-all after the first round.

The next round was also even, but it was in the third round that Kenilworth pulled ahead, winning it 3-1. That 2-point lead was retained through the 4th round of singles, and the final round of doubles, both even-stevens, giving a final score of 10-8 to Kenilworth.

Both sides worked steadily and diligently to take command of their games, and it is interesting to note that 10 of the 18 games were scored 7-5 or 7-6; very close battles, with a lot of defensive play taking place, before being able to take the prize of shooting for the hoop. However, there was also great generosity, as in one of my games my opponent scored two of my hoops by knocking my ball through, and then I returned the favour with one of hers. Nigel also had an unfortunate outcome when he hit, what became the final ball of the match, at high speed, trying to clear a ball immediately in front of the hoop, but instead peeling it through like an arrow!

Despite the unseasonably cool weather, there was a lot of warmth and good conversation between the teams, making it a very enjoyable and sociable day. We were very glad to have a well-appointed pavilion to shelter in between games, and to make hot drinks. We now look forward to our next match at Himley, near Dudley, on July 24th.


It was so bad that the tough and hardy tennis players took shelter in our pavilion but sadly I couldn't get any to sign up for croquet membership though.

Tony played a blinder and won all three matches each with a good hoop margin.


Robert came second with two wins, Jeff third with one win and lan was tail-end Charlie with zero wins.

Kenilworth came out as eventual winners in a closely fought match in the club's debut in this new **WMF GC 6+ handicap league -** winning the final match to secure victory.

Kenilworth's team consisted of Tony Watmore, Jeff Lyndsey and morning players Robert Zara and Val Moss. Due to holidays, sickness and unavailability Robert and Val were replaced by Anne Langley and Colin Abrahams in the afternoon. It was very gracious of Edgbaston captain Julie to allow this to ensure the match went ahead.

The weather was fair and the lawns looked in great condition. The format was 4 singles matches against each opponent and 2 doubles matches at the end. Despite Kenilworth's combined handicaps being 35 against Edgbaston's 25 the home club leapt into an early lead, of 7-5 after 3 rounds no doubt helped by familiarity with the lawns.

However as Edgbaston became familiar with the lawns the fightback was on - so much so that with one pairs' match still playing, the score was 9-8 to the hosts. A win for Kenilworth would secure the match - a win for Edgbaston would see a drawn result.

In this match Jeff and Colin were playing Merryn and Chris - and Merryn had been Edgbaston's star player - and they raced into a 2-0 lead. However Jeff and Colin persisted and recovered so the match went to the Golden Hoop. Merryn rather surprisingly missed two relatively straight forward hoops and Colin secured the match win and Kenilworth overall victory.

Star of the show was Jeff Lyndsey who won 4 of his 5 matches. Special mention to Colin who having cycled in the heat to attend the match was - by his own admission - slow off the blocks losing his singles match and tossed in at the deep end against Edgbaston's better pairing of Merryn and Chris. Despite going 2-0 down he and Jeff fought back valiantly to win the match and game. Not bad for a nonagenarian!

However this was a team effort and thanks must go to all the players- especially Val. Anne and Colin who stood in at short notice.

Onwards and upwards as we play Himley at their place in July. This will be intriguing as Edgbaston's comments on Himley's lawns ranged from "interesting" to "agricultural". In addition we have a return match against Edgbaston - who will be seeking revenge in either late September or early October.

A row of spectators sat on a raised bank and applauded the many good shots, which was probably a new experience for most of us! After the first two matches, with Kenilworth leading by 6 games to 2, there was a long lunch break, with the two sides mixing, sharing experiences and chatting, much about Wimbledon!

The afternoon continued with the final two matches, keenly contested but interspersed with friendly comments and laughter at some of the stranger shots, like John's back-to-the-hoop jump shot or Elizabeth's double-in-off! They had some very strong players, but overall we were probably a slightly more experienced side. The final score of 13-3 was qualified by 3 of the 16 games going to Golden Hoops and a further 4 reaching 7-5,



with Stourbridge scoring 75% of the hoops!

I felt that the hoops seemed to be a little more forgiving than our hoops - the side bars seemed a little thinner than ours and angled shots seemed to have a greater success of going through - but that may have been an illusion on my part and certainly no sour grapes as it was the same for both sides.



For the record the six games we won were as follows:

A FABULOUS WEEK-END TOURNAMENT.....DESPITE LOSING ALL OF MY GAMES!! 8 June 2024 Cliff Daniel



On 8 June I set off early to drive to Cheltenham to play in the Bernard Neale Challenge that always attracts a strong entry of players and this year there were 17 players with handicaps ranging from -2.5 to +6. My handicap is 4.5, and the chasm between my handicap and -2, the handicap of my first opponent Sarah Hayes, is so great that I would need to win approximately 145 consecutive matches in order to reach her

handicap! The tournament was played Level Advanced so there were no bisques available to help me! I was allowed a couple of opportunities only and managed to run a mere 2 hoops before losing this game 2-26 inside 90 minutes. However Sarah offered me a little encouragement regarding my play, which helped me to approach my next game not too disheartened.

My second game was against Jim Blenkinsop whose handicap was 2.5, and happened to be the lawn manager at this club so was aware of most of the variations in the surface of the lawns. Our match was played without a time limit a feature that I much prefer as it stops opponents with a slender lead playing negatively hoping to win narrowly when time runs out. So our game stretched from late morning to teatime, allowing us to have a break for lunch, a home-made 2 course affair with coffee that traditionally is excellent. Our game was well contested for about 3 hours and either of us could have won it but Jim finally put together a fine break of 6 hoops to win 26-13.

My third game of the day was against Martin Murray, a formidable opponent with a handicap of -0.5. Both of us managed to get one ball round to 4-back but struggled to get the second ball beyond hoop 3, and so we agreed to 'peg down' our game, planning to resume the following morning. Interestingly the next day when we returned to the lawn we found that somebody had removed all of the markers for the balls so we had to estimate the location of the 4 balls!! The game followed the pattern of my second game of the weekend...with both of us having real chances of victory but it was Martin who eventually put together a crucial break, winning 26-13 after over 4 hours play!

And so my 4th game started late morning against Tim Saxton, a player from Bristol who had a handicap of -1. Both of us were surprised at the impressive way I started the game, running some angled hoops as well as making a couple of medium length roquets as I scored an '8-hoop' break. When we stopped for lunch I was leading 9-0 and feeling very confident indeed. After lunch we both made reasonable progress but Tim eventually found some good form to have one ball for 'peg' and the other for 'penult', whist my balls were for hoop 5 and for rover.

However following a good medium length roquet with my front ball I successfully ran 'rover' and 'pegged out' Tim's front ball to set up a '3-ball ending'. Once back on the lawn I managed to take my 'back' ball through hoops 5, 6 and one-back, and having all three balls well placed was on course to win the game! Sadly my would-be pioneer to 3-back hit the peg and I then missed a short roquet allowing Tim to win the game 26-20.

However losing games does have its compensations! My bar bill was ZERO....and on both days I was treated to the tea & home-made cake! The weekend had been brilliant...playing 'single-banked' untimed games on quality lawns, often bathed in sunshine, was truly pleasurable. Also losing whilst playing 'level'



to such outstanding players cost me very few points on my handicap card. Furthermore I was able to spectate part of the final, a long tussle between Ed Duckworth and David Goacher, eventually won by David.

It had been agreed that this league match would be played with three players per team rather than the usual four. So the morning session comprised one singles game and one doubles game.



The doubles paired Cliff with Nigel against Brian Christmas & George James from Church Stretton. The home pair received 2.5 bisques but these could only be used by Nigel since Cliff's handicap was below 6 and it was decided to wait a while to use them. Both Cliff and Nigel were guilty of squandering opportunities to build a lengthy break by missing VERY SHORT ROQUETS as well as RELATIVELY STRAIGHTFORWARD HOOPS. George, however, seemed to adjust quickly to the pace of the lawn, and, full of confidence, put together an excellent break early in the game that proved decisive. Brian himself found some good form towards the end of the 3½ hour game giving

the visitors victory 18-15 when time was called.

In the singles game Mervyn played against Stuart Ray who, having a handicap of 14 received 8 bisques as opposed to Mervyn's 2 bisques. Stuart started well running 6 hoops using 5 of his bisques. Mervyn sensibly realised that he should bide his time and eventually made up the deficit and overtook his opponent. Stuart then made some poor decisions regarding the use of his remaining bisques and Mervyn, although a little disappointed with his own play, triumphed 26-13 with over an hour left on the timer.

So the match was poised at 1-1 when the three singles matches started after lunch.





Nigel's game against Stuart was the first to finish. As always Nigel seemed very relaxed and was clearly enjoying his game. However one of his attempted roquets is worth a special mention. Nigel had hit his own ball quite hard and after travelling about 3 metres and seeming set to hit the target ball it, quite inexplicably, cleared [Ed: jumped over!] this ball and then continued to the boundary. This clearly confounded and amused those watching, which included the 'lawn manager' Philip Wood!! Both players had a number of bisques at their

disposal but it was Nigel who made the best use of them, comfortably triumphing 26-13.



Mervyn was paired to play George and, over the years, they have enjoyed some very close games. This game proved to be extremely close too, despite George setting up a substantial lead early on. Mervyn kept pegging away and was genuinely surprised to realise that the hoop score was level at 12-12 despite George having his forward ball on 'penult'. George managed to pull away again but he then started to make some mistakes and Mervyn again caught up at 19-19. Both players then had opportunities to win but then, with Mervyn poised to clinch the game when leading 23-22, George made a 15 yard roquet from which he completed victory 26-23. It had been a fabulous game that had clearly entertained the small group of

spectators.

So the match score was 2-2 with Cliff and Brian, the two captains, contesting the fifth game. Cliff had managed to set up what seemed to be a commanding lead of 18-10 with only 30 minutes of time left to play. However Brian, aided by a couple of missed hoops by Cliff, took a few risks and gradually clawed back to trail 15-18.. When he started his final turn his forward ball was able to run 'four-back' from which he engineered a good 'rush' to 'penult' which he confidently ran. He then managed to use the two opponent's balls to give himself a chance to run 'rover' which would have given him a huge



advantage forcing the need for a 'golden hoop'. Sadly for him he missed this hoop, and Cliff, much relieved, proceeded to run 2 hoops himself to restore his own self-confidence and the final score was 20-17, giving the home team victory overall 3-2.

BRIAN SHORNEY CBE

Brian Shorney died suddenly and unexpectedly on the 7th of February. Brian had a distinguished career in the public service with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food (MAFF) and with the diplomatic service.

He was on the CA Council from 2010 to 2019. For the first 6 years he was the South West Federation Representative on Council. He was Chairman of Council from 2016 to 2018 and Chairman of the Handicap Committee from 2011 to 2014.

He was born into a farming family near Abergavenny and studied agriculture at the University of Aberystwyth. He joined the MAFF farm advisory service where the policy was to send new entrants as far as possible from home. Brian therefore began his career in March (Cambridgeshire) and then Norfolk.

He married his childhood sweetheart, Christine, in 1961 and they had three children. In the 1970s the advisory service added Farm Business Management advice and Brian was promoted to the new unit at Aberystwyth. I was in the same unit and we both lived with our families in the village of Llanrhystud. To understand how Brian and I acquired our addiction to croquet, we need a brief diversion into the little known history of Trawsgoed Croquet Club.

The regional (this was well before the idea of devolution) HQ of the advisory service in Wales was Trawsgoed Hall – a large country house some 8 miles to the east of Aberystwyth. It had been "acquired" by the government in 1947 to house specialists in agricultural science and husbandry and it was attached to an experimental husbandry farm. There

was a large and hilly lawn divided by paths and a fountain into four. We found some croquet equipment and more hoops and mallets were made by the machinery advisers.

We could happily have settled into social croquet with our own rules but someone had the brilliant idea of contacting the Croquet Association, based in distant Hurlingham. This happily coincided with the CA's development policy of increasing the number of clubs and Liz Neal was sent from Wimbledon to West Wales to help us. She arranged for us to attend a coaching course at Bisham Abbey led by Bernard Neal. This was also remarkable because Bernard was a busy academic, chairman of the CA council and a top player and yet willing to give up two days to coach beginners.

Liz also sent the Prichard family en masse from Gobion Manor to play an encouraging friendly. We remained keen. We played friendlies with West Midlands clubs and, in 1973, we dared to enter the Longman Cup. We got to the semi-final, losing to Stourbridge. After those heights, Brian and I moved away; the club lost its ambition and faded away. I believe that the only remaining relic of the club is some very large hoop clips which can still be seen at Surbiton CC.

Brian's next move was a plum posting to be the agricultural attaché at the British High Commission in Canberra where he did two tours. He took his mallet but croquet in Canberra was in the hands of some formidable ladies and he found it difficult to fit in. He found consolation in his alternative passion of rugby refereeing until his return to Blighty and croquet. He was appointed regional head of MAFF in the South West where he became a member of Kington Langley Croquet Club, and later a member of both Budleigh Salterton and Cheltenham. He took early retirement and was awarded his CBE. He then went on to found Drew Associates, an agricultural policy consultancy with a special interest in helping EU candidate countries in eastern Europe.

Brian and Christine later moved to Hereford where he became a member at Eardisley and also held various positions in the West Midlands Croquet Federation. It was typical of Brian's generosity and commitment that he was still willing to serve and assist croquet clubs right up until the end of his life. Brian was buried in the churchyard of Llanwenarth where he and Christine had once been members of the choir. He leaves Christine, his children Mark, Jane, and Clare, and six grandchildren.
