The Charlecote Cup 2019.

The early season Cup started with 11 entrants – which is a good number for any of our competitions. It's intended for those of handicaps 4 and above although the Cup is played on level handicaps so there are no extra turns. Cup competitions are usually played in whites but it turned out that warm, winter clothing of any colour was more appropriate. Jump shots were not allowed as the lawns hadn't begun to recover from last year's hot, dry weather and the potential for damage to them had to be minimised.

80% of the block games had been played – which, again, is a good, high proportion for any of our block competitions. The semi-finals ended up being played by the winner of one block and the second placed player of the other and vice versa. That pitched Peter Kristunas v Ian Robertson, and Philip Blake v Cliff Daniel. After good, close games, Peter and Cliff emerged as finalists. So far so good but, unfortunately, various circumstances meant that they couldn't play the final until June and that's well outside the usual rule of an April final. A dilemma; what to do? Cancel the Cup; postpone the final; toss a coin, or arrange an arm-wrestling match instead?

The solution was to look back at the block games that showed that Peter and Cliff had already played each other with Cliff being the winner on that occasion, so the Charlecote Cup was awarded to him. Congratulations to Cliff on his first foray into the competition.

Report:

The format for a 4 man team match in the league comprises 7 games; 3 in the morning, with one doubles and 2 singles, followed by 4 singles games in the afternoon.

Cliff and Phil M played the doubles game for Kenilworth and faced an uphill task for their opponents received 7 bisques and used them sparingly to set up a sizeable lead. The home pair squandered the few opportunities offered and lost 7-20.

On the other lawn Philip W was also conceding bisques and his opponent used them wisely, running hoops and minimising time on the lawn for Philip by generally leaving him with very long roquets! Although Philip rallied well towards the end of the game he lost 11-17.

Mervyn however was receiving bisques which he used shrewdly and aided by some good fortune - by his own admission - with his attempts at lengthy roquets he was always in command and won convincingly 20-13.

So at lunch the visitors led 2-1 and needed to win just 2 of the afternoon singles games.

Philip W was again conceding bisques to a very capable opponent and again was let down by missing too many roquets and lost 17-26.

Phil M knew his game would be tough, conceding 8 bisques to his opponent, Joe, who had played so well during the morning doubles game. However, once the bisques had been used up, Phil was able to put pressure on Joe and won 14-9, thereby maintaining his 100% record in singles matches in this league.

Mervyn's game was close throughout and, frustratingly, his opponent retained his very last bisque until the latter stages of the game. Mervyn battled gamely but eventually lost 13-19. Cliff's game with the opposing captain, Brian Christmas, proved to be extremely dramatic indeed! After approximately 1hr 15mins of the allotted 3 hours and Brian leading 22-6, with the innings and with no bisques left, the game looked like being the first to finish. However Cliff managed a few small breaks that made the score rather more respectable until he managed to secure a sizeable break taking his 'back' ball to peg which allowed him to 'peg out' his opponent's 'front' ball and an unlikely victory suddenly appeared possible! With Cliff poised to win, Brian ran 'rover' and then had a difficult shot to hit the peg and so win the game himself. However he missed this attempt and Cliff, full of self-confidence, kept his nerve to complete the win with less than 1 minute left on the clock!

Report:

The morning matches comprised 2 singles and 1 doubles games

Mervyn played his singles game against Sean, the top player from Shrewsbury. As Mervyn received such a large number of bisques - 9.5 in fact - Sean opened very cautiously indeed. This allowed Mervyn to delay taking any bisques at all by simply running hoops in short bursts using the tactic of '2 balling'. Eventually Sean needed to take risks but by then it was too late and Mervyn completed a resounding victory 26-11 in fairly rapid time whilst still having 3.5 bisques available! Phil Mander was also receiving bisques and was so much in control that he was, unsurprisingly, unable to resist the challenge - 3 times! - of attempting to peel his partner ball when the possibility arose. Even though he forfeited the break each time he won comfortably 26-14.

In the doubles game Philip W and Cliff needed to be patient as they were conceding 6 bisques. The score was relatively close when their opponents had only one bisque left and over an hour of play was left. However they squandered the excellent opportunities offered to them and the home pair controlled the endgame with Alan, the stronger player, taking all the turns! In fact Alan managed a 5 hoop break towards the end, resulting in a 15-10 win for the home pair.

So the afternoon singles games commenced with Kenilworth leading 2-1.

Cliff faced Sean and used all of his 5 bisques to set up a good lead with his forward ball on 'rover' and the other ball on 'penult' whilst Sean had yet to run a hoop. This lead began to look insufficient as Sean calmly took his first ball through 11 hoops in a single break! However he faltered with the second ball when he missed a short roquet thereby allowing Cliff back into the game. With careful play Cliff managed to seal victory 26-11.

Philip W, still struggling with his roquets, soon fell behind in his game and looked to have little chance of catching up. However, thanks to one particularly long break, he managed to draw level and so set up a tense finish. Sadly for Philip, his opponent, Alan, rallied well and held on to win 18-17 on time.

Mervyn only had 2 bisques for his afternoon game but with shrewd play he set up a commanding lead. But his dogged opponent, Barbara, clawed herself back into the game and the closing stages proved to be very tense indeed with both players making uncharacteristic errors. However Mervyn held on to win 20-19 on time, thereby guaranteeing Kenilworth their first win of the season! In fact the final margin was 5-2 for Phil Mander completed yet another singles win. His game v Isobel was played in a very relaxed mode. Phil risked his eccentric opening - to good effect - and he cheerfully waited for his opponent to squander her 8 bisques and he then won comfortably.

West Midlands Golf Croquet League: Kenilworth v Eardisley at Eardisley.


